# **IMPORTANT Leaders Federation ByLaw Changes**

### **Items Added**

Article III. Membership Section 3.03

- C. Elected adult officers can serve two year terms and shall then be up for reelection if they chose to hold office again.
- F. Members of the Executive Board must attend a minimum of 60% of Board meetings. Should an Executive Board member not attend the minimum 60%, they are ineligible to run for office following the complete of their terms.

**Article IV Meetings** 

Section 4.04 If unable to attend a meeting in person, Executive Board members may vote via Zoom, speaker phone or text.

### **Items Removed**

Article III. Membership Section 3.03

1. Membership of the Executive Board shall be limited to no more than two adults or youth leaders from the same club.

2.

- C. Elected adult officers can serve two consecutive terms of two years terms each before going off one year.
  - D. and can serve two consecutive terms.

### WHO DO WE WORK WITH

This summer we collaborated with Clark County ADRC, Parks and Forestry, Health Department, and other county agencies to provide different educational experiences. The events welcomed a total of 45 youth and 15 youth that were not 4-H members.

### Because of Extension Work

I saw firsthand the positive impact of our inclusive programming. At our 4-H promotional tent at the fair I had the opportunity to meet several youth.



# Chocolate Meringue

From: Leala Scott Cook Temp: 375 degrees Serves: 6 to 8 Cook Time: 20 min



### Instructions

1.

Preheat oven to 375°

2

For the crust, place flour and salt into food processor fitted with a steel blade and pulse to mix. Dice butter. Add diced butter and cold shortening to processor. Add ice water to the mixture down the feed tube with machine running. Pulse machine until dough forms a ball. Wrap in plastic wrap, Refrigerate 30 minutes. Cut dough in half. Roll one of the pieces out on a well-floured board rolling from the center to the edge. Use the other half if you want to make a double crust. Bake 475° for 8-10 minutes.

3:

For the meringue, separate the egg whites from the egg yolks. Set aside the egg yolks. The egg whites should be room temperature before beginning to prepare the meringue. Beat egg whites with whisk attachment in bowl to form soft peaks. (The meringue will stand, but will still liik a little frothy.) Add the cream of tartar, sugar, and vanilla to the egg whites while continuing to beat the egg whites. Continue beating until stiff peaks form.

4:

For the filling, mix cocoa, flour, and sugar in a medium saucepan. In a separate bowl, whisk 4 egg yolks, salt, and milk. Stir the wet mixture into the dry ingredients in the saucepan. Cook at medium heat until thick, about 5 minutes. Stir in the chocolate chips, vanilla and butter. Pour into pre-baked pie crust.

5:

Gently mound the meringue over the hot filling, being careful not to leave any gaps between the meringue and crust. Bake the pie in the 375° oven until meringue is golden brown, about 20 minutes. Be careful not to overcook the meringue. If your oven does not brown the peaks, increase the oven temperature to 500° for one to two minutes to ensure browning, but not overcooking.

6:

Remove the pie form the oven and allow cooking. Once the pie is cool, tent aluminum foil over the top of pie and place in the refrigerator for up to 12 hours. Make sure the pie is cool before placing in the refrigerator or condensation.

### Ingredients

#### Crust:

- 3 cups All-purpose flour
- 1 Tablespoon Kosher salt
- 1 1/2 sticks Very cold butter
- 1/3 cup Crisco vegetable shortening, very cold
- 6 Tablespoons Ice cold water, plus more if dough is too thick

#### Meringue:

- 6 egg whites—room temperature
- (keep 4 egg yolks for pie filling)
- 1/2 teaspoon Cream of tartar
- 1/3 cup Superfine sugar
- 1 teaspoon Vanilla extract

#### Chocolate Pie filling:

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 rounded Tablespoons Cocoa powder
- 3 rounded Tablespoons Flour
- 1 pinch Salt
- · 4 egg yolks
- 1/2 stick butter
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup good semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

### Marbled Brownies

From: Makenna Erickson Cook Temp: 350°
Serves: 24 Cook Time: 35-40 min

### Instructions

1:

Heat oven to 350°. Grease 13 x 9 cake pan.

2:

Microwave chocolate and butter in large microwavable bowl, about 2 minutes, stir until well blended. Add 2 cups sugar and mix well. Stir in 4 eggs, add flour and mix well. Pour into prepared pan.

3:

Mix cream cheese, 1 egg, peanut butter and 1/2 cup sugar until well blended and smooth. Drop by spoonful's over batter. Swirl with table knife to marble. Bake 35-40 minutes, or until toothpick placed in center comes out with just a few fudgy crumbs. Do not overbake.

Fifth step.

### Ingredients

4 oz unsweetened chocolate

3/4 cup butter

2 1/2 cups sugar divided

5 eggs

1 cup flour

1-8 oz cream cheese softened

1/2 cup creamy peanut butter

### Caramel Layer Chocolate Bars

From: Aspyn LaPage Cook Temp: 350° Serves: 24 Cook Time: 23-26 min

### Instructions

1:

Heat oven to 350°.

2

Remove 2 tablespoons of evaporated milk and set aside. Put rest of milk and caramels in a medium saucepan over low heat, stirring often, melting caramels until smooth.

3:

In a large bowl combine cake mix, nuts, butter, and the remaining 2 tablespoons of milk, mix until crumbly.

4

Press half of crumbs into the bottom of an ungreased 13 x 9 inch cake pan. Reserve the rest of the mixture for the topping. Bake for 8 minutes.

5

Sprinkle the chocolate chips over the hot curst. Them carefully spread the caramel mixture over the chips. Crumble the reserve mixture over the caramel layer.

6

Bake an additional 15-18 minutes or until the bars are set.

7:

Let cool and then cut and enjoy.



### Ingredients

1-5 oz can evaporated milk

1-14 oz pkg caramels, unwrapped

1 German Chocolate cake mix

1 cup chopped nuts

1/2 cup butter, softened

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
