Meeting Minutes

Fall Annual Business Meeting October 7,2025

Meeting was called to order at 6:00 pm by President Lois Becker at the Greenwood Area Emergency Services Building in Greenwood with the Flag Pledge and Creed. Roll call was taken. Twelve members were present representing 5 clubs. The Secretary's minutes from 2024 were read and placed on file.

Lois Becker gave the Treasurer's Report: Treasurer's Report with budget was presented. Received \$6,200.88 from Dairy Bar. Donna wrote \$1,000.00 check to Loyal FCCLA. Treasurer Deb Gries VOIDED the check that she wrote to FCCLA. Lois informed us that we will be receiving a bill for printing costs (.10¢ a page) going forward. Lois will get clarification regarding what this will entail. Update subscription cost going up \$2.00 per subscription. The budgeted amount should be fine. Motion by Mary Kip to approve treasurer's report and budget with second by Peggy Buchda, motion carried.

<u>Joanne Trunkel – VP for Programs & Community Outreach Report</u>: Presentation on State Conference: 246 attending participants from 41 Counties. Joanne attended the "Ask a Question" educational program – topic: Suicide Prevention. Was a very informative presentation. The speakers were excellent. Cultural Arts had 335 entries from 37 counties. Clark County did very well: 11 blue ribbons, 1 red ribbon and 1 medallion. 141 items were donated for the silent auction which raised \$2,669.00. The 2026 State Conference will be held in Eau Claire. There will be a 1-day registration option.

<u>Peggy Buchda - Bookworm report:</u> Peggy brought a sample set of books for us to review. Ordered 400 8-book sets that will be distributed throughout the county this year. Also received 1,050 bonus books to be distributed as needed. There is an issue with the English to Spanish activity sheet translations. We may or may not get them this year due to budget cuts and short staffing issues.

Peggy asked for approval from the Board to apply for a grant from the Clark County Community Foundation. Motion by Joanne Trunkel to allow Peggy to apply for the grant, second by Mary Kip. Motion carried. Peggy received approval from the Board to apply for this grant.

<u>Dairy Bar</u>: After expenses, the Dairy Bar earned a net profit of \$7,200.88.

HCE Day: Looking for ideas for our next HCE Day event. If you have an idea please let Lois know as soon as possible.

Historian: HCE started here in 1939.

Marketing/Membership: Received an award for Membership Recruitment. Need to spread the word about HCE.

<u>International/Citizenship</u>: The containers that were loaded and sent to Nicaragua have been turned away at the port of entry to Nicaragua. The government will not allow entry. Working on a solution to this issue. Clark County received notice right before conference regarding this issue and therefore our shoe box donations are not on these containers. Joanne Trunkel is currently storing the shoe box donations until a resolution has been received regarding this situation.

<u>Scholarship</u>: Received thank you notes from all of the scholarship recipients. Committee member positions have been filled for next year.

Unfinished/New Business:

The following Committee positions are or will be open and we will need volunteers to fill them:

International/Citizenship – 2/3 people

Clark County HCE Standing Rules were read by Lois Becker. The updated rules will go into effect January 1, 2026.

<u>HCE Board positions</u>: The following positions will be opening Historian and President. We will need to find members to fill these officer positions on the HCE Board. If you are interested or know someone that may be interested in one of these positions please contact Lois Becker.
